TITLE: **Salford Community Safety Strategy 2020 - 23**

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Panel is requested to review the final version of the Community Safety Strategy 2020 – 23 for Salford and to comment on crime and disorder issues locally.

DETAILS:

1. Statutory framework

- 1.1 Community Safety Partnerships have a statutory requirement to develop a plan (i.e. community safety strategy), which addresses the identified crime and disorder in the area and sets out the priorities that the partnership will deliver to impact on these. The plan should identify the role of each partner agency in supporting delivery of the priorities and how this will be resourced, and will contain performance measures and information about the way in

which the partnership will engage with their communities.

2 Development of the new strategy

- 2.1 Options for development of the new strategy were discussed at CSP Board in February and the strategy has been developed since then. All partner agencies have been widely consulted. Partner agencies include Greater Manchester Police, GM Fire and Rescue, Salford Clinical Commissioning Group and the National Probation Service.
- 2.2 An article in Life in Salford, issued August 2019, introduced the priorities for the new strategy and invited residents to provide their comments either by completing an online form or by responding to questions contained in leaflets made available in Gateways. The public consultation opened 12 August and will close on 13 September 2019. Young people at the Youth Council discussed the issues for them at a meeting held on 3 September and provided their comments in written form.
- 2.3 Residents were asked to state what their priorities were for tackling crime and disorder in their local areas and also if people from different backgrounds get on well together. In cases where people feel that different groups don't get on we've asked them to suggest ways to help improve this.
- 2.4 The consultation results are still being analysed but the emerging priorities for those responding to the survey are reducing anti-social behaviour, reducing burglary, tackling gangs and gang related violence and reducing car crime.
- 2.5 Just over 80% of people filling in the online form agreed that people in their local area get on well together. For those that disagreed they suggested that community events could bring people together and that reducing anti-social behaviour would also aid cohesion.
- 2.6 The results of the consultation will be used to inform the development of the Strategy's action plan.

3 Sign off
